Pregnant women reassured measures are in place to protect them from coronavirus

Over 1,447 babies have been safely delivered since lockdown began on 23 March. Pregnant women who are worried about attending antenatal appointments are being reassured that measures are in place to protect them from coronavirus.

As part of the NHS' rapid response to COVID-19, maternity services in Northamptonshire have had to change some of the care pathways and services in order to keep everyone safe and to follow national guidance.

This includes minimising face-toface appointments including obstetric clinic appointments and making amendments to community services to limit non-essential faceto-face contact.

As part of the social distancing strategy and also in line with the national guidance, birth partners are also being restricted to one per woman at this time.

Dr Emma Donnelly, Local GP and Clinical Lead for Maternity Services at Northamptonshire CCG said: "Being pregnant is a joyful time but it can also bring a lot of stress and anxiety to women and their partners, and we understand many of you are worried about the impact of coronavirus. In these worrying times we want you to feel assured that everything possible is being done to ensure your safety and retain the high levels of care you would receive at any other time.



"It's really important to keep in contact with your midwife during your pregnancy and maintain any appointments you have with them. If you have any concerns about your pregnancy or about your baby's wellbeing, please do not delay contacting your midwife or maternity services."

Patricia Ryan, Deputy Director of Midwifery, at NGH said: "We still want expectant mums to attend their appointments and see their midwives regularly. If they do have any concerns our team will be happy to support them".

Reopening businesses advised to assess Legionnaires' disease risk

Businesses which have had to close buildings or reduce occupancy or activity during the coronavirus outbreak are being advised to carry out risk assessments prior to reopening, as water system stagnation can occur due to lack of use and increase the risks of Legionnaires' disease.

Employers, the self-employed and people in control of premises, such as landlords, have a duty to protect people by identifying and controlling risks associated with Legionella. This means businesses are responsible for carrying out a risk assessment, to determine whether further action is required to ensure premises are safe to reopen.

Legionnaires' disease is a lung infection, caused by inhaling small droplets of water, suspended in the air, which contain Legionella bacteria. Legionnaire's disease is rarely transferred between people and can be treated with antibiotics, however of concern at the moment is the fact symptoms are similar to those linked with COVID-19, so people may not recognise they have been infected. Symptoms of Legionnaire's Disease include a high temperature or fever, a cough, along with muscles pains, a headache and sometimes pneumonia. People who are feeling unwell with similar unexplained symptoms should ring NHS111.

Lucy Wightman, Director of Public Health for Northamptonshire said: "This has been a very challenging time for businesses, with many sites needing to close or limit occupancy for a considerable period of time.

"Businesses should seek to be proactive in assessing the risk of Legionnaire's Disease occurring within their workplaces to minimise the risk caused by this potentially fatal illness as they prepare to reopen.

"Each of the borough and district councils have Environmental Health Officers who are working hard to support businesses and workplaces in returning to work, so please use this resource to support you in taking the necessary steps to ensure that your workplaces are safe."

Northamptonshire welcomes more COVID-19 Mobile Testing Units

More Mobile Testing Units (MTUs) have been deployed in Northamptonshire to help local people with coronavirus symptoms to access testing closer to where they live.

An MTU was deployed in Corby throughout the weekend and a further unit will be in Silverstone from today (Monday) until Wednesday.


The military-led facilities are accessible by appointment only for people with symptoms of coronavirus (new, continuous cough; high temperature; loss of or change in sense of smell or taste). Appointments can be made via the Gov.UK website at www.gov.uk/guidance/coronavirus-covid-19-getting-tested

Mobile Testing Units have been deployed in different locations around the county throughout May and June, providing opportunities for Northamptonshire residents to get tested without having to travel too far.

Mobile units are only in a location for a few days. They have an integrated one-way system that allows people with an appointment to attend for either walk-in or drive-through testing.

Essential workers are given priority.







Multi-agency operation to improve safety across town

A multi-agency operation conducted last Saturday (6 June) in Northampton saw social distancing compliance checks completed in residential areas and at more than 35 businesses.

Northampton Borough Council, Northamptonshire Police and the Northampton Partnership Homes conducted inspections and provided advice on social distancing measures to over 35 businesses.

Following the observations, social distancing requirements were found as satisfactory at most premises. Two breaches of the business regulations were identified along with a number of potential breaches of licensing legislation. Advice on health and safety at work was provided at one of the premises.

Councillor Mike Hallam, Cabinet member for environment, said: "We know that the vast majority of individuals and organisations are following the guidance and I would appeal to everyone including the business community to carry on with the great work protecting customers and staff and I encourage everyone who requires further clarification on the new rules to contact our Environmental Health and Licensing team.



"We appreciate how hard it is for businesses that are closed, and in some cases operating very differently, but it's important that they reopen safely and support staff and customers to adhere to necessary rules through appropriate measures, including social distancing, good hygiene, enhanced cleaning, shielding employees who are particularly vulnerable to severe illness and supporting employees with symptoms to self-isolate."

Chief Inspector Pete Basham, said: "We continue to work with our partners to engage with the county's businesses - we want them to have all the information they need to comply with the government's social distancing guidelines which will enable them to trade successfully and safely.

"We urge the public to be patient while stores put measures in place so that when they are open, their employees and customers are safe."

Nicky McKenzie, assistant director of housing at Northampton Partnership Homes said: "We have been working in close partnership with the local authorities and other agencies throughout the Covid-19 outbreak and we were pleased to be able to support this important initiative."

Lots of scammers are using coronavirus to trick people into giving them money or personal information they can use to commit fraud. Help stop them in your community by talking to your friends and family about scams, and what they can do to protect themselves.

Scams to look out for include:

- Advertising face masks or medical equipment at high prices
- Emails or texts pretending to be from the government
- Emails offering life insurance against coronavirus
- People knocking at your door and asking for money for a fake charity

Protect yourself against coronavirus scams:

- Make sure you only use trusted sources of information about coronavirus
- If you see emails about coronavirus from someone you don't know, don't click on any links or buy anything
- Don't give money or personal details to anyone you don't know or trust - for example, if someone knocks on your door and offers to help

Northamptonshire Police

Police shields to be turned into PPE

Officers from Northamptonshire Police's Operations Team are helping to provide essential personal protective equipment (PPE) to their colleagues in the local NHS.



Following an audit of the Force's public order equipment, the team unearthed more than 50 redundant shields, including 30 which were bought nearly two decades ago, to provide police support to the prison service.

However, the proposed industrial action didn't take place and as the 7ft Armadillo shields were designed for a very specific function, the stock became surplus to requirements and abandoned in storage - until now!

With such plastic materials in high demand due to the COVID-19 pandemic, officers have delivered the shields to Kettering General Hospital NHS Foundation Trust and Northampton General Hospital NHS Trust to be repurposed into PPE.

The shields will be used to create plastic screens in the reception and clinical areas at both hospitals, as well as at the Corby Urgent Care Centre and other community outpatient clinics. More here.

Students take part in schools challenge

More than 150 entries from young people across Northamptonshire were received for the Virtual Community Safety Challenge COVID-19 and a winner has now been decided. The competition asked secondary school pupils to take on a creative challenge to design ways to make people think about and to raise awareness of important COVID-19 messages.

The challenge reached more than 5,500 students from 13 schools. Students worked by themselves or in virtual teams, sent in a variety of inspired entries, ranging from songs and poems to posters, short stories, online campaigns and even diaries.

A panel of judges, including Chief Fire Officer Darren Dovey, Fire and Crime Commissioner Stephen Mold and



Concessionary bus pass arrangements in Northamptonshire to return to normal

Concessionary bus pass arrangements in Northamptonshire will return to normal from June 15, 2020.

The passes allow eligible older and disabled people to travel for free from 9.30am to 11pm on weekdays, and all day at weekends and bank holidays.

In March, Northamptonshire County Council agreed to temporarily extend the current bus concessionary travel scheme to 24 hours a day to enable older and vulnerable residents to access essential services, such as early morning food shopping.

But with lockdown restrictions easing and social distancing measures remaining in place, the capacity of services may be reduced, therefore limited peakhour travel is prioritised for those who may work in shops or factories, or for education.

County Council Cabinet Member for Place, Highways and the Environment, Cllr Jason Smithers said: "Supermarkets are more accessible now than at the beginning of the crisis and the easing of lockdown restrictions means more people will be using public transport for work and school.

"Social distancing measures are in place on buses and as some services may be reduced, we want to ensure there is enough room on routes for workers and pupils, while ensuring concessionary pass holders can still enjoy free travel."

Key Workers


NERC (Northamptonshire Emergency Response Corps) are hosting a Volunteer Evening: Managing your mental health as a key worker during the coronavirus outbreak
